TUSD sent 70 TUSD students in grades 7-12 to the **Arizona Indian Education Association Youth Conference** this year. The Governing Board and I would like to honor two of those students who were recognized with scholarship awards at the conference, which was held earlier this year.

The goals of the Youth Conference are:

- To provide youth the knowledge and skills to achieve their academic and career goals
- To honor youth and their ability to transform our communities in a positive way

This year's two winners from TUSD are **Nadira Mitchell**, a 7<sup>th</sup> grade student from Utterback Magnet, awarded as a Junior High Student of the Year and **Rebecca Soto**, a 9<sup>th</sup> grade student from Cholla High Magnet School, awarded as a High School Student of the Year.

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**EXPLORE** is the first part of a testing system that goes on to include the ACT.

Our next three students have excelled in that testing. Out of 40,623 students who took the 2013-14 EXPLORE assessment; they are each one of only fifty-three students who had a perfect score.

The EXPLORE test is intended to give information about a student's knowledge, skill, interests, and plans. Students can use this information to plan high school coursework and begin thinking about college and work. The score report tells students how their scores compare to those of other students across the nation.

It can determine the amount of help a student needs in seven areas:

- Exploring options for education, careers, and jobs after high school
- Improving writing skills
- Improving reading speed or comprehension
- Improving study skills
- Improving mathematical skills
- Improving computer skills
- Improving public speaking skills
