
- To increase career awareness of district eighth graders using an exciting new event structure.



Planning for Safety, Designing for Resilience

Student safety is a topic of universal concern for both school boards and members of the community in general. In the context of threats from gun violence and natural disasters, this presentation addressed key elements, considerations and strategies of security planning and resilient design. The presentation also include lessons learned from well-documented cases of disaster recovery.

Achieving Academic Success In Minority Males:

Studies show that creating shifts in behavioral management to increase academic engagement is imperative. This workshop focused on a model that identifies motivational mentorship as a key component in doing that. It focused on formulating a plan for recruiting motivational mentors internally and externally. Other elements included: strategies for engaging parents and community members in the educational process through the motivational mentoring model.

Study Hall 2F: Why Auto Mechanics Matters

This session addressed the relevance of student learning and how districts can bridge core academics to real-world applications. The continuum of CTE coursework in the US is under fire, ever shrinking funding requires a realignment of CTE courses/spaces to better prepare our students and serve our communities.
