Next I would like to talk about our **Reading Recovery Team.** Tucson Unified is offering Reading Recovery to first graders at 12 of our elementary schools. Currently, we are the only district in Arizona providing this service for our students.

We are grateful to the wonderful people who are putting their time and effort into the program. Reading Recovery certification requires a full year of successful completion of graduate level coursework in the areas of literacy theory, research and practice, and training also includes working with students daily.

Tonight, I am proud to recognize our 2016 TUSD Reading Recovery Teachers and some of the students who have participated in the program. Please come on up.

We have heard concerns that Tucson Unified School District isn't supporting science education or that we aren't supporting the continuation of Foss Kits for K-8.

Foss Kits are an integral part of the K-8 Science curriculum. Foss Kits will continue to be utilized in grades K-8. The science curriculum guides and maps align the kits with the science standards.

We have also heard questions about personnel. Science has been supported by grants:

- Race to the Top Year 4 (expired on 12.21.15)
- Race to the Top no cost extension (expires on 06.30.15 for PD only)
- Math and Science Partnership Science (expired on 02.26.16)

Three positions were funded under these grants. The three personnel funded through the grants have been designated as District Initiative Transfers and will be returning to the classroom for SY 2016-17. Curriculum & Instruction has worked with Anna Maiden, Chief Human Resources Officer, on this process, and she has provided guidance and support.

The DIT process does not affect the FOSS Kits and the support for schools and classrooms in the area of science. As Curriculum and Instruction moves forward, we will be utilizing classroom science teachers to assist with curriculum development and enhancements. Classroom teachers will receive professional development in understanding the science standards and use their application knowledge in this process. This is the same process Curriculum and Instruction utilizes within the other content areas. The Tucson Unified School District's curriculum is developed, designed and tested with teachers, by teachers, for teachers. Science will continue to be supported K-12 and the Foss Kits will continue to be utilized in grades K-8.

Grants:

We are currently applying for two grants;

- **i3 Innovation Grant** This grant will support new or substantially more effective practices for addressing widely shared challenges. This will also support novel innovative projects that support our local needs.
- MSP/Magnet Grant This will support STEM, new or revised magnet schools. This
 grant will support projects designed to improve student achievement or other related
 outcomes by supporting local or regional partnerships. It will also support projects that
 propose a strategy or practice supported by evidence of promise.
