Superintendent's Report 05.13.14

To begin my report tonight I would like to thank the two musical groups that were playing for us tonight. The **Mariachis from White Elementary** under the direction of **William Mark** and the **Rincon/UHS Jazz Band** under the direction of **Jeff Marchant**.

On April 5th the Rincon/University High School Jazz Band won the Highland Jazz festival in the High School Jazz Band Division and was the only high participating group asked to perform in the artist's concert at the culmination of the three day, statewide festival.

On May 2nd, the band received the highest possible award, a "Superior with Distinction" at the State Jazz Festival hosted at South Mountain High School in Phoenix.

Awesome performances, both – I wish we could have representative performances for all of our music groups to showcase the talented musicians we have attending our schools.

Before we begin to recognize our honorees tonight, I would like to call up **former Tucson City Councilman, Mr. Rodney Glassman**. He and his wife Sasha, both attorneys, have written three children's books. They are written in both English and Spanish, illustrated by Arizona school children, and feature an ecology-minded rabbit by the name of Jeremy Jack Rabbit.

They have distributed thousands of books free of charge to school districts across the state, including our own. This year and last, they distributed over 4,000 books to our kindergarten students and thousands more to other districts across the state.

Mr. Glassman, will you please come up front?

We have several students being recognized for being winners in Tucson's River of Words Youth Poetry and Art contest. According to their website, River of Words encourages young people to explore how water moves through the landscape and the connections that plants, animals and people have to water. After exploring these topics children ages 5-19 have the opportunity to share their observations and understandings through their entries of poetry and/or visual art to the contest.

At the presentation, the teachers were told there were 600 poetry submissions and 600 art submissions. Only 50 pieces are chosen to be published. Out of those chosen, TUSD had 15 of the winners! We also have two **Flinn Scholars**. One of whom could not be here tonight. **Graham Place** of Sabino High School was unable to attend tonight but we want to congratulate him. **Carly Snyder** of University High School <u>is</u> here with us tonight.

More than <u>600</u> high school seniors applied for the scholarship. These are **two of only 20 students selected** across the state for the honor, which recognizes high-achieving seniors who have demonstrated leadership and community service. **The scholarship package is valued at more than \$100,000**, covering the cost of tuition to one of the state's three public universities, room and board, funding for international study-related travel and professional development, university faculty mentorship and other benefits. These are two amazing students, congratulations on such an awesome accomplishment!

Recently, Rincon's Chapter of Junior State of America won the Ernest Andrew Rogers Award for Outstanding Junior State Chapter of the Year for the State of Arizona. They will now go on to compete on May 15 via Webinar for the JSA National Civic Award! The Chapter of the Year awardees receive an engraved plaque, a \$1,000 scholarship to a Junior Statesmen Summer School, a full scholarship to a Junior Statesmen Institute for one chapter member, one free private room for the Teacher Advisor to all of next year's conventions and they become eligible for the JSA National Civic Impact Award.
