Our very own Palo Verde High Magnet School is home to the 2014 Arizona Division III Baseball Champions!!

Though a baseball player all his life, Coach Jim Mentz began coaching girls soccer at Palo Verde in 1988. They've won a state record 280 games in 26 years. He also began coaching baseball there in 1995.

This year they raised money for improvements by cleaning up the mess at the Tucson Rodeo. During spring break they spent hours painting dugouts, fixing the outfield fence and putting up safety netting.

Nobody thought of Palo Verde as a threat to win the division championship. They reached the semifinals against Phoenix Fountain Hills, which has played in seven state championship games since 2001! Then they determined to break the 18 game winning streak of Phoenix Northwest Christian – and they did just that.

Coach Mentz promised that if they ever won the state title he would get a tattoo. He did get a tattoo but not in the traditional sense. He was struck above the right eye by a wild throw during the first round of the state playoffs. He went to the emergency room and received 8 stitches. Released at 1AM, he was on the bus to the quarterfinals at 6AM and now considers that his permanent "tattoo" and a remembrance of these boys who led them to the state title.

We are all so proud of this team and their coaches.

Palo Verde is also the proud home of the 2014 Arizona Division III Track & Field Discus Champion, Drake De Yonge and his coach, John Tadlock.

We have found out a bit about Drake De Yonge besides the fact that he is a great athlete, who also came in 6th in the shotput competition. He has overcome some extremely tough medical obstacles to attain the title of Division III Discus State Champion of Arizona.

5 years ago, Drake was participating in one of the many sports in which he has been involved and shattered his right leg. Surgeons said damage to his bones and arteries might cause him to lose his foot. Drake's determination and optimism helped him overcome the limitations and outcome the doctors gave him. Drake was in a wheelchair for 2 months, used a walker for a month, and spent 6 months in physical therapy.

Drake went on to continue wrestling, playing football for the next 4 years, and competing in track & field in discus and shotput.

In addition, Drake excels at drafting and welding and has competed at state competition for Skills USA. He won 4th place for the 2014 Skills USA Mechanical Drafting competition. Through everything he maintained a 3.0 GPA.

Drake helped with construction of the Wetland project funded by a grant with Club Congress and also volunteers his time to help draft ideas for adaptive equipment used to help people with disabilities.

Another fan of Track & Field – and Cross Country is **Mike Bekedam**, a teacher at **Lineweaver**. Mike received the first TUSD Interscholastics Service Award for his many years of hard work and dedication in organizing and supervising the sports of Cross Country and Track & Field for ALL TUSD elementary schools. A huge undertaking – maybe it is his "magic" (he's also a magician).

Lineweaver staff and students love Mr. Bekedam and all of his enthusiastic, hard work for not only their school but all of TUSD's elementary schools. We were unable to recognize him at the Superintendent's Cup event so we would like to make up for that now.

Congratulations, Mike, and thanks for going above and beyond and going the extra mile for the benefit of all TUSD elementary students.

Since we are on a sports roll right now, I would like to take just a moment to highlight an accomplishment of our own **Director of Interscholastics**, **Herman House**.

Mr. House, has been with the district for about 19 years. He was recently selected as the 2014 Distinguished Service Athletic Director of Arizona by the Arizona Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association.

Herman earned the Certified Athletics Administrator (CAA) title last year. To earn this distinction, candidates must demonstrate the highest level of knowledge and expertise in the field of interscholastic athletic administration. That process included a thorough evaluation of his educational background, experience, professional contributions, as well as a comprehensive written exam. The program identifies athletic directors nationally who demonstrate a certifiable level of both experience and expertise in the field of athletic administration.

His latest award is presented to a limited number of AIAAA members each year in recognition of length of service, special accomplishments and contributions at local, state and national levels.

This is certainly a reflection on his dedication to interscholastics and most especially to TUSD.

Herman will be recognized by the Association on September 8 at a banquet in Prescott. Congratulations!
