### ❖ 5<sup>th</sup> Year Seniors

- Goal is to graduate in December of their cohort year.
- Attend Eagle Academy full time.

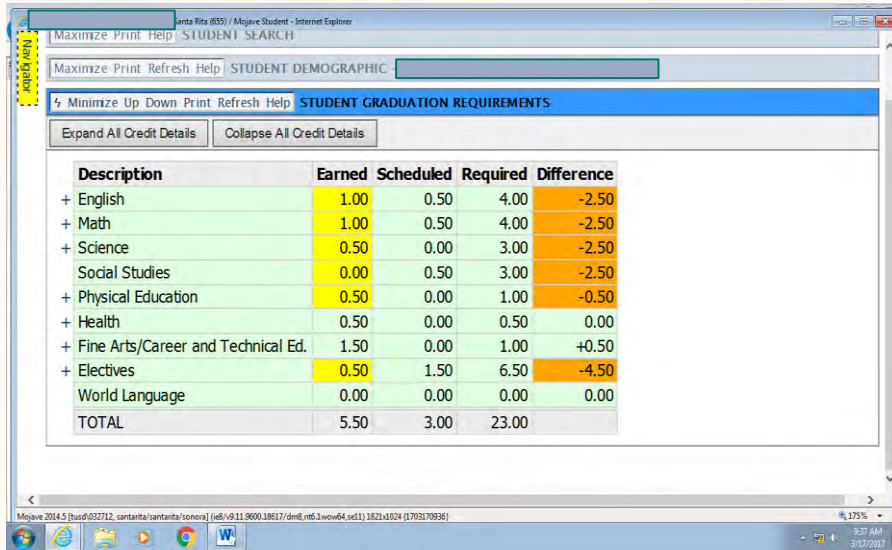
### ❖ Seniors

- Goal is to graduate in May of their cohort year.
- Far behind their cohort & need to meet graduation requirements.
- Are placed in a three period block (replacing of electives).
- Are monitored (i.e Attendance, Behavior, and Edgenuity completions) to earn a spot in the Spring Semester.

### ❖ Juniors

- Goal is to become credit current.
- Far behind in credits and need to catch up with their current cohort.
- Are placed in a three hour block period (replacing electives or a science class).

- ❖ Full time placement to:
  - Recover missing credits
  - Complete remaining three mandatory senior classes (ELA, Economics & Math)
- ❖ Fall semester EA students who showed tremendous growth in attendance, behavior and work ethic.
  - These students are not guaranteed a slot - they must earn it.

## EAGLE ACADEMY PLEDGE

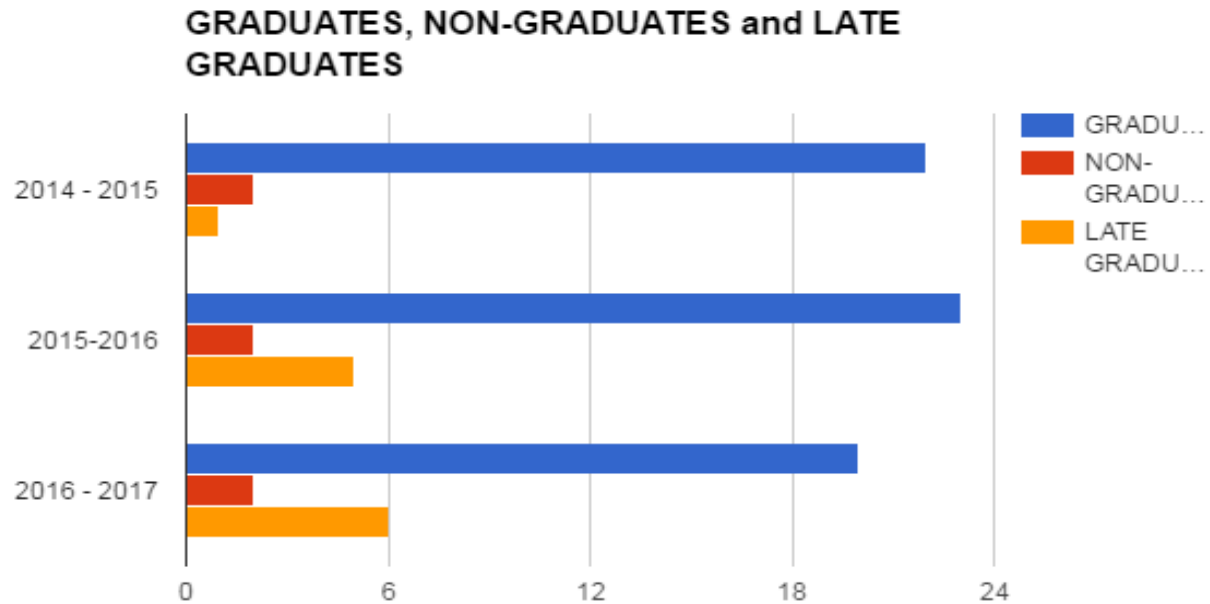


*This semester I pledge to try everyday to accomplish the following things.*

  - If the student continues to not comply to the program's expectations, the student will be placed back into their regular cohort schedule.

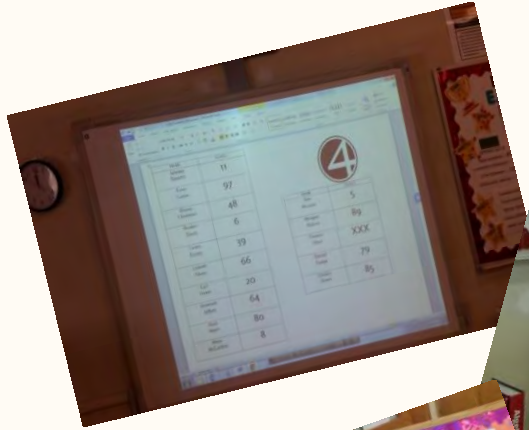

## ❖ Growth & Positivity

- Focus should be on student progress, not past.
- Emphasize meeting goals and making good decisions.
- Continuous positive feedback for students.
- Whenever possible, give attention to positive, avoiding negative interactions.

## ❖ Student Independence

- Encourage students to ask for help or resources.
- Check in with students to ensure they are on track, but do not “babysit” them.

## ❖ Weekly Stars

- Student recognitions done each Monday.

## ❖ Celebration Boards

- Recognized students' names are displayed.

## ❖ Tickets

- Students earn tickets in three ways
  - Completing courses
  - Meeting daily goals over half of the week
  - Turning in their cell phone for at least three days.

## ❖ Student of the Week

- Students who stand out through improvement, growth, effort or completion are recognized as students of the week.

## ❖ Shout Outs

- Students earn Eagle SPIRIT cards.
  - Attend tutoring.
  - Take notes with each lesson.
  - Work from home.

- ❖ Monitor student enrollments, completions & progress toward graduation
- ❖ Enroll students in needed courses
- ❖ Quarterly (minimum) progress reports & check ins
- ❖ Troubleshoot EdGenuity problems (tech-knowledge)
- ❖ Submit completed grade reports to the registrar
- ❖ Ensure that transcripts are updated with courses as students complete
- ❖ Exit interviews & conferences

# *Eagle Academy Expectations, Structure & Routine*

## ❖ Overall Structure

- Structure of the Academy is to complete smaller goals on the way to larger accomplishments.
- Students work to become independent learners.
- Students eventually take control of their learning path.
- Success is consistently rewarded.

## ❖ Passing Thresholds

- An assessment's passing threshold can be adjusted to meet an IEP's requirements.

## ❖ Additional Time

- The amount of time given to finish an assessment can be increased over even set to "unlimited."

## ❖ Additional Checks

- Students receive "checks" on their assessments before submission.
- These checks tell them their incorrect response.
- They can focus on the ones that are wrong.

## ❖ Additional Attempts

- Non-ExEd students have a maximum of 3 attempts on assessments; this can be adjusted according to students' needs.

## ❖ Unlocked Questions

- Usually, when a student selects "Save & Exit" on an assessment, their questions lock and they cannot return to them.
- For ExEd students, the questions can be unlocked.

## ❖ Paper Options

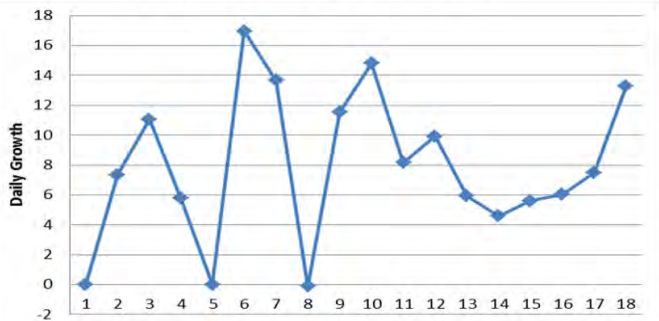
- Assessment questions can be screenshot and put on paper.
- Students have more space to work.
- It removes the anxiety that can come from being "on the clock."

## ❖ Period-by-Period

- Data is tracked by period to monitor student progress towards the incentivized short-term goals.

## ❖ Day-by-Day

# WHY?

- ▶ To Create a plan that will help SRHS:
  - ▶ Improve enrollment.
  - ▶ Improve academic achievement.
  - ▶ Improve the culture and climate of the school.
  - ▶ Increase students access to post secondary schools.
- ▶ A plan that ties into the TUSD District Strategic plan and the Unitary Status Plan.

# SANTA RITA HIGH SCHOOL ACADEMY PLANNING

*"Collaboratively creating a new and innovative educational approach to inspire and provide a different opportunity for TUSD students, parents, and SRHS community."*

- ▶ Our goal is to provide a unique program option for students.
- ▶ Attending high school with an option to become a college student at PCC for those who plan to earn college credit. This could be applied to an AGEC Certificate or even towards an Associate's Degree at Pima Community College.

# Why is a College and Career Readiness Academy Option necessary?

The CCRA option is a program designed so that students can earn a high school diploma and beyond.

- ▶ Industrial certificate and/or
- ▶ Obtain college credit
  - ▶ The opportunity to earn credit up to an AGEC-A certificate, credit applied to an Associate's degree or two years of credit toward a Bachelor's degree and college tuition savings for parents.
- ▶ Ease the transition to college.
- ▶ Option to continue towards completing an Associates at Pima or transfer to a four year college with low cost.

# WHO WILL THE CCRA OPTION SERVE?

The CCRA focuses on students who are underrepresented in higher education or for those who have low motivation for academic achievement, career preparation or post secondary education.

- ▶ Low-income
- ▶ First Generation college-goers
- ▶ Diverse student population

# BENEFITS

- Option of a high school diploma with more meaning. “Beyond a Diploma”
  - Diploma
  - Certificates
  - College Credit = Tuition Savings
  - Opportunity to complete an Associate’s Degree after high school
- Students can begin taking Dual College/High School Credit courses as early as Spring of their Sophomore year. TUSD Policy of Junior classification based on credits.
- College education is affordable and accessible
  - Pima Community College - \$3,164/yr U of A - \$16,918/yr including books and other fees.

# CHALLENGES

- Dual Certified Teachers
  - Currently PCC & SRHS are developing a plan
  - Long Term Sub
  - Existing teachers lack of Master' s Degrees
- Teacher instructional shift from traditional role to facilitator role for PBL Process
- Student and parent continuous education for understanding the process of PBL/Academy/Pathway/college application process
- Slow process because of reputation of the school
- Academies take a lot of work to implement. Lack of teacher trust.
- No Budget for this CCRA
