These courses are designed to teach US History and US Government from a particular viewpoint or perspective, but students should also have opportunities to evaluate authors' differing points of view on the same historical event or issue by assessing the authors' claims, reasoning, and evidence. In order to provide students with the necessary rigor and scope, teachers are encouraged to use multiple and/or opposing texts to promote the use of the inquiry process so that students

will develop arguments from multiple perspectives. Students should be able to demonstrate critical reading skills developed through the intentional, though not exclusive, use of a variety of resources that ensure a balanced approach.
