THMS History:



- Oldest operating high school in Arizona
- September 10, 1906- the first high school in Tucson started classes
- 1908- moved to the newly constructed building at 501 E. 6th St (Roskruge Magnet Middle School)
- 1924- Tucson High School's Main building was completed



THMS History:

- Main building was designed by Architect Henry
 O. Jaastad at a cost of \$750,000
- National Registry of Historic Places
- 1924- first class = 175 students
- 1956- largest high school in the United States with 6800 students
- 2016-3186 students






Magnet History:


