Kat has taken a leadership role in Pueblo's Lunch and Learn program. The program brings community leaders in to speak to students during lunchtime. Kat helped create the program, and she even cooks for it. She is also a member of the Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers and is heavily involved in the school garden project and harvesting and selling at the farmer's market. She is a role model for other students and keeps the garden project going.

Kat also volunteers at Higher Ground as a tutor. She is in cosmetology now, and once she finishes up that area of study, she plans to move to Portland to become a writer.

## The next person I would like to recognize is Krystal Scheid [PRONOUNCED "SHYED"], who was named Magnet Coordinator of the Year.

They were also treated to an incredible performance by the Mariachi Azlán de Pueblo High School at the San Xavier del Bac Mission. It was a beautiful performance in a beautiful location.

If you are wondering how the Chinese educators heard about our wonderful program, the answer is the power of the Internet. They saw our website and were intrigued to learn more about the power of the arts in schools.

Dr. Ashcraft, thank you for being a wonderful representative of TUSD and the arts. We can all feel a sense of pride when visitors want to learn more about the work we do.

**The next recognition is for a groundbreaking—no pun intended accomplishment by the Manzo Elementary garden team.** Manzo is the first school in Pima County to get an Arizona Department of Health Services Certification. What does that mean? It means that foods grown in Manzo's incredible garden can be cooked up and served in the cafeteria.

If you've never seen Manzo's garden, it is an impressive operation. Not only do they have a full in-ground garden, they have a greenhouse, a mini-LEO project like the big one at the Biosphere 2, they have a tilapia ecosystem, chickens, composting, rainwater cisterns ... it's really quite incredible.

I know a lot of work went into gaining the certification to enable the school to supply its own food to the cafeteria. In restaurants, they call that Farm to Table—quite the trend these days. It's exciting to realize we are the first in our county to have Farm to Cafeteria program!

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Finally, I'd like to congratulate the schools that win the honor of flying the Attendance flag this month. This is a great initiative we are running for the school year. Each month, the school with the highest percentage of attendance gets the flag. We are recognizing the first, second and third place winners for October tonight.

**And finally, in the high schools,** University was the October winner with 95.3 percent attendance. Sabino came in second with 93.2 percent, and Sahuaro was third with 90.3 percent.
